Often independent institutions, publicly supported

Care centres for young with special needs

Public support and supervision

Institutions where you live, typically for young with psychiatric diseases and problems, developmental disturbances or drug abuse. Animals, farming and gardening is offered as an activity or part of a

treatment

Examples:

Pionergruppen, Kragebjerg, Holmstrupgaard, Aarhus Siersbæklund Døgncenter, Ringkøbing



Therapy Gardens


- In some cases referred from a doctor

Abused women:


Danners terapihave, København: Abused women

What is the potential in Denmark for Green Care?

- We are in close contact with nature and agriculture
 - Many farms are closed down or reorganised opens the opportunities for new alternative activities
