The international community has for the past 10 years been assisting the Afghan government in security reform. Most of this assistance has been directed toward strengthening the Afghan Army, and both international and national debates have focused on the relative weighting of military and humanitarian/development aid, and the challenges of civil-military relations. Rather surprisingly, the role of the civil police in Afghanistan has until the last few years been conspicuously absent from these debates. This is despite the fact that, in the end, it is the Afghan civil police who will be expected to ensure the security of ordinary women, men and children on the part of the government. This is a daunting task, considering the immense challenges the government faces in developing such a force.

Norway has contributed to building the competence of the Afghan police through the Norwegian Police Project (NORAF) since 2003. Around 100 Norwegian police have served in Afghanistan, but there has been very little discussion of either their role or their experiences. What have they learned from their engagement with the Afghan police, and how can we use these experiences in thinking about the future role of the civil police in Afghanistan? This seminar will create a space to discuss these and other issues both from the perspectives of the Norwegian police, as well as from policymakers, development actors and researchers. It is hoped that these discussions will spark more interest in exploring the role of the civil police outside of the military framework in which it has been ensnared...
